

George Szekely, a distinguished artist with a prolific career spanning numerous decades, has etched an enduring legacy in the art world with his unconventional and inspiring methods.

Going beyond the usual boundaries, Szekely employs a diverse array of experimental materials and techniques in his work.

From crafting art with improvised musical instruments, like a collapsible TV antenna adorned with markers, to delving into the emotional depths with series such as Cancer Diaries, where he captures raw experiences in a hospital room, Szekely's approach is deeply personal and reflective.

Cancer Diaries

These works are an emolional outpouring during the most difficult times for Szekely, his mother's hard-fought cancer battle as well as his days dealing with his own cancer diagnasis in later years. He spent many hours at her bedside creating sketches from X-rays, EKG scans, medication labels, warnings, and notices.

Szekely's early life was marked by the challenges of growing up in tumultuous Hungary, and eventually escoping his homeland and artiving in New York. He grew up with very few toys and thrived by using his

imagination to create toys. He relished items like plastic that were a rare and unfamiliar commodity in the old country.

He was drawn to playful media, humorous tools, inner themes, and new ways to approach art-making. The rules and formulas he learned as a child, he referred to as "communist art," and searched relentlessly for the antidote.

In later years, he realized the influence that things like snowball making and life events had on his attistry, especially the method of shaping color paint forms and dots into art.











Sculpting in Paint

This series showcases Szekely's formative artistic practice of creatively painting with color dots by squeezing paint out of tubes. Over the years, this method was electrified and enlarged into large form paintings inspired by bolls, bubbles, balloons, and interpretations of snowball constructions. Colorful paint marks were often created from the inspiration of these objects with utensils like ice cream scoopers.



This sentimental and creative collection represents the artists 45 years of enjoying his rural Woodstock property where his almost century old white born and larger arena of the outdoors served as his art studio. He was inspired by the summer light and colors set on fire by the sky and incorporated creative convoses, such as paper or fabric, letting nature redirect his paint using unique paintbrushes like branches, feathers, berries, rocks, or crowling insects.

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Wallpaper & Floor Tile Paintings

Influenced by the transformative nature of wallpaper in his family's Brooklyn apartment, Szekely experimented with wallpaper rolls and floor tilles as unconventional canvases for his art. This series, marked by athletic gestures and expressive paint, emerged from the fusion of wallpaper patterns and dynamic painting techniques, challenging traditional notions of easel painting.

His dedication to pushing artistic boundaries is evident in projects like Wallpaper & Floor Ille Pointings, which may have played a role in influencing how art is displayed in museums today—rather than simply displaying framed art on walls, today artists are allowed to draw and point directly on the walls of their formerly sacred spaces.

Drawing inspiration from his childhood experiences in Brooklyn, Szekely recoils the vibrant displays of lollipops, plastic toys, and other novelties at Helen's corner candy store. This childhood fascination with plastics became the foundation for his early artistic endeavors, using heat-sealed plastic pockets to encase colors and experimenting with unconventional techniques such as dipping and spraying. Ultimately, Ingots of Color represents a nostalgic and innovative exploration of materials, childhood memories, and the artistic process.

In Szekely's own words, art is a response to In Szekely's own words, art is a response to experience, whether internal or external, and his fearliess experimentation has fueled a career dedicated to rebuilding and finding new ways of expression. His belief in the communicative power of art is evident in his series of books, where he unfolds the story of his life through visual compositions, tunes, and dances.

The series, developed over five years, transforms humble symbols into powerful visual poetry, inviting viewers to participate in the evolving relationships and messages conveyed through each composition. Szekely's playful approach to painting, experimentation with lines, and incorporation of found objects showcase his dedication to making art a daily, enjoyable challenge.
